Manager
Town of Jay**

To the Citizen of Jay,

This is the day of instant communication and the Town of Jay is working to achieve this also. Our website has a tremendous amount of information on it, including assessing information, the ability to re-register your vehicles and to get your hunting and fishing licenses. You can find our website at www.jay-maine.org.

This has been a very unusual year. Each department in town has had some challenges but we have worked together on them. In September the finance clerk's position was eliminated. We have found that the work is just too much for one person and so we have done some in house shuffling in order to make this work.

With the new building code going into effect on July 1, we are going to see some major changes. As of writing this, all of the details are not worked out but when they are we will post them. The State has imposed the Building Code on us and we don't have any choices in that. If we do not create and pass the Administrative part of that code locally, we will be forced to enforce it under the State's rules.

I would urge you to review your tax bill. There are many people in town who are eligible for the Homestead Exemption that are not getting it. This exemption takes \$10,000 worth of value off of your tax bill. It is simple to apply and we have the applications here at the town office. If you don't know if you are eligible, please give us a call and we will help you. Another important exemption is the Veteran's and Veteran's Widow's exemption. We can help you determine if you are eligible for this one also.

Recently we had an informational meeting here at the town office on electricity bills. It was very well received and so I would like to try a few more this coming year. Northstar Ambulance is going to

come in the spring and do one on the signs and symptoms of heart attack and stroke, and what to do if you suspect you or another person is having one. One of the topics I would like to see a presentation on is the different things that go into the tax bills. Sometimes people forget that the tax bill is made up of many different parts and not just municipal costs. If there are other topics you would like addressed, please let me know.

Our Selectmen's meetings are open to the public and they are generally on the 2nd and 4th Monday. If you would like to be on the agenda to address an issue, please give me a call so that I can do that. There are a lot of exciting things happening in Jay and we are happy to see development starting again in this area.

We have not heard yet about the location of the Gazebo but the fund raising is ongoing. Dot White has been working on this and hopefully we will have a location announced soon.


The Annual Town Meeting Vote and Election is on June 12th this year. I hope that you will all come out and vote.

Dear Citizens of Jay:

The consolidation process that united the schools in Jay, Livermore and Livermore Falls was the most significant change process that our schools have experienced in recent history. The consolidation law itself created a number of very real hurdles for the re-organization to be in place on July 1, 2011, and for the schools to be ready for the 2011-2012 school year in August. Here are a few of the issues:

- Financially, all of the accounts that were in place in the two school systems, had to be totally recreated in the new RSU 73 name. RSU 73 is not a combination of the two school systems; it is a new school district.
- The Livermore Falls Middle School closure and the subsequent combining of all of the grade 6 to 12 students at the Spruce Mountain Middle School involved significant moving, and reorganization on the part of Principal, Scott Albert, the middle school staff, and our custodial staff. Appreciation is in order for their efforts.
- The student athletes, their coaches and their fans are all worthy of praise for the way they have made the new Phoenix teams outstanding. In addition, the joint booster group has done an excellent job of supporting our students and our community.
- The two high schools have cooperated this year, and efforts to further consolidate the two high school programs into one comprehensive offering are ongoing.
- The new thirteen member RSU 73 Board of Directors has provided valuable leadership in carrying out the intent of the consolidation process.

- Clearly each of our RSU 73 staff has made a very real difference in the establishment of our new regional system.

Over time, the ability of our schools to serve as an effective life preparation for our young people has been influenced by the economics of an age where all of us, as taxpayers, are challenged. Local schools are a very important part of what a community is, and we sincerely appreciate the support that you have given us.

Report of the Selectmen of The Town of Jay

Dear Taxpayers and Residents of the Town of Jay,

As has been the history of Jay for the last few years, the Selectmen have been very involved and very busy doing the town's work.

On the Annual Town Meeting Warrant this year you will find an ordinance for the Administration of the Building Code that has been imposed on us by the State Legislature. We don't have a choice, but with this ordinance, we are going to be the least restrictive that we can be. If this does not pass, the state will impose its' regulations on us. Even saying that, we will have to have building permits and we will be doing enforcement. Rather than add additional money in the budget, we would recommend that Third Party Inspectors be used to do the inspections. Only residents who are doing the building and renovations will have to pay for these inspections. Last year we had 8 new builds and that cost can be included in the mortgage costs. Our code officer will issue the building permits and will also issue a certificate of occupancy after the report is delivered to the office with the necessary information.

Thanks to the efforts of the Department Heads and the Town Manager we now have a new Personnel Policy. We have been with an outdated policy for some time and this is very comprehensive. While we know of towns that have hired people to do that we felt that we had the talent and dedication on the team to do this and we were right. Shiloh LaFreniere led this work and has done an excellent job.

Another issue you will find on the Town Meeting Warrant is the PACE Ordinance. We want to give the residents of Jay an

opportunity to participate in this program. PACE is a program where you can get low interest long term loans to winterize and do other things to make your home more comfortable. This could include such things as heating systems, windows and doors.

Single sort recycling is going very well as is the pickup with one truck instead of two. John Johnson and Todd Hiscock have received the ecomaine's Environmental Award this year for the work they have done on the program. Many people have had a hard time switching to clear plastic bags but in the end, this has paid off. We are disposing of our recyclables at \$0 right now except for transportation and trash is almost \$62.00 per ton. We appreciate the cooperation of the public and the staff at the transfer station in making this work.

We have extended the Town Manager's contract for 1 year. She was offered a three year contract but has decided that a year from June she will retire. Next year we will be looking for the replacement of the manager. This is a process that we hope to do in-house rather than hiring a firm to do this.

The Board of Selectmen would like to thank the employees of the Town of Jay as well as the citizens that have supported them in their efforts this year. It is not an easy position to be in and it is time consuming, but those people on the board know that their work is important and meaningful.

To the Citizens of Jay:

In 2011, the Town of Jay held three Municipal elections and one State Election. The first election was held on January 25th to decide if the school units of Jay and RSU 36 wished to combine. The Town of Jay voted overwhelmingly with a vote of 710 to 185, to combine to make the new RSU 73. On April 19th another Special Election was held to elect School Board Members for the new RSU. The School then held its Annual Budget Meeting on June 6th to adopt the school budget. On June 14th the Town held its Annual Town Meeting to vote on the municipal budget and to finish the school budget process. Voter turnout was very low at the Town Meeting with only 274 voters.

At the June 14th Town Meeting the Town enacted the Recycling & Waste Disposal Ordinance. The Town of Jay uses single sort recycling which enables many more items to be recycled and not separated. The Town passed the updated Comprehensive Plan which will help shape Jay's future. The Town also accepted a sewer easement from Toby and Jennifer Kachnovich for property adjacent to the Town Office.


This year, RSU 73 will hold its Annual Budget Meeting on June 5th. At this meeting voters will decide on the amount of the budget for the schools. Then at the Annual Town Meeting voters will be asked whether or not to accept that budget.

The Annual Town Meeting this year will be held in conjunction with the State Primary Election on June 12th at the Community Building with voting starting at 8:00 AM and go to 8:00 PM. At this meeting citizens will be voting on three ordinances. The first is the Town of Jay Property Assessed and Clean Energy (Pace) Ordinance which will allow residents to obtain low interest loans for the purpose of making cost effective home energy improvements. The second ordinance is the Town of Jay Maine Uniform Building and Energy Code Administrative Ordinance which deals with statewide building codes which the Town of Jay must begin enforcing on July 1st. The last ordinance is the Twenty-fifth Ordinance Amending the Jay Environmental Control and Improvement Ordinance which amends the Town of Jay subdivision law. As well as voting on the usual budget items the Town will also vote on raising \$200,000.00 for the

reconstruction and reconfiguration of the intersection of the Hyde Road and Route 133. This project is anticipated to be done in conjunction with the State of Maine Department of Transportation.

In 2011, 494 dogs were licensed and 1,524 licenses were processed for Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, including ATV's, snowmobiles, boats and hunting and fishing licenses. There were also 34 marriages, 42 births, and 39 deaths in the Town of Jay.

Assessors Report 2012

CURRENT REAL ESTATE MARKET

Over the course of the past fiscal year, there have been 60 property transfers within the Town of Jay. Of those 60 sales, 9 of them included a bank that was either foreclosing/selling/auctioning a property. These numbers are considerably better than the previous fiscal year whereas of 55 transfers, 14 of them included a bank that was either foreclosing/selling/auctioning a property.

According to the State Tax Assessors review, The Town of Jay's assessments remain well within State standards enabling the Town to certify a ratio of 100% and a Quality Rating of 11 again this year. The Jay Assessors remain committed to ensuring all assessments are fair and equitable.

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS

Please don't forget to apply for your Homestead Exemption if you have not already. The exempted amount will be \$10,000 in assessed valuation and will show an estimated savings per household of approximately \$134.00.

VETERANS EXEMPTIONS

The Maine Revenue Service has expanded/reestablished some federally recognized wartime periods to grant exemptions to veterans (or their widows) that served in the Armed Forces. Please contact our Assessors office for more information.

PERSONAL PROPERTY

We want to make Jay businesses aware of two programs that offer either a tax reimbursement or tax exemption for qualifying equipment. These programs are called Business Equipment Tax Reimbursement (BETR) and Business Equipment Tax Exemption (BETE). Both programs require property owners to submit applications and both programs have specific criteria for qualifying owners and property. Information regarding the BETE and BETR programs is available on line at www.maine.gov or at the Jay Assessors' Office.

Annual report ending 2011



To: Selectmen, Town Manager and citizens of Jay:

The Jay Police Department experienced another very busy year. The police department handled 8,350 calls for services. The department consists of a Chief, one Sergeant, a Corporal and four officers. The Sergeant and Corporal work assigned patrol shifts, as do the patrol officers. One officer is assigned as a special investigator. The Chief also assists with some investigations of criminal cases and assists with patrol functions as well as performing administrative duties. The department continues to work very closely with all county, state and federal law enforcement agencies.

The Jay Police Department was very busy this year handling firearm thefts, illegal drug trafficking, assaults and domestic violence cases and clearing the majority of them. Our neighboring towns have experienced a greater number of these crimes. The Jay Police Department has an outstanding staff that is well trained and has the skills needed to maintain the highest standards of professional excellence. It is because of their skills and dedication that our town has one of the lowest crime rates and a clearance rate of crime second to none in Franklin County.

Detective Caton spends eight hours a week working in the RSU 73 schools in Jay. He assists the school staff with issues and also spends many positive hours with the students. This gives students the chance to see and talk to an officer in a positive environment. Officer Nicholas Gulliver and Detective Caton provided the Halloween Safety Program to the students in kindergarten and grade one this year. It was a great success.

We continue our All Terrain Vehicle program each summer patrolling the trailways in Jay. Cpl. Jeff Fournier and Detective Caton are state certified ATV safety instructors and instruct one ATV safety course each year that

the department sponsors. We would also like to thank the Western Maine ATV Club for all the work they do to help keep our trailways safe. They are a great organization that we are proud to work with each year.

The police department continues to provide neighborhood watch programs for its citizens at the 17 Lavoie St complex. It provides the citizens of the complex with vital information in regards to staying safe. Remember when leaving your home for a vacation or extended period of time to let us help you keep your home safe. We have a property check program that is offered to all our Jay residents. Please call the Jay Police Department at 897-6766 for details.


Officers of the Jay Police Department continue to be trained in First Aid, CPR and in the use of the Automated External Defibrillator, which we carry in our front line and overlap cruisers. We respond to all ambulance calls, when possible, within the town. The department responded to and investigated 179 motor vehicle accidents. We work very closely with the EMS service and the fire department.

At our request this year, we are working with the Maine Bureau of Labor Standards to assure that we achieve total compliance in regards to workplace safety, training and mandatory policies. It is our hope and desire to achieve the SHAPE award from the Maine Bureau of Labor Standards.

The Jay Police Department is a very proactive department that believes that the police and its citizens working together is a proven formula that works and is what makes our town one of the safest communities to live in within Franklin County.

In closing, I wish to thank the board of selectpersons, town manager and the citizens for their continued support of the police department. I also want to thank the staff of the Jay Police Department for their dedication to service. I am honored to serve the citizens of Jay as their Police Chief.

Annual Report of the Transfer Station/Recycling Facility

To the Citizens of Jay

Last year was our first year of collecting our recyclable material in a single sort format with the switch from the old sorting method occurring in early February. The new curbside collector truck which has individual compartments for solid waste and recyclables was put into service in early April cutting the number of trucks on the road daily from two to one while requiring one less staff position. This staffing reduction along with the filling of the supervisor's position from within has permanently reduced staffing levels from eight to six. No employees were displaced as a result of the staff reduction. The twenty year old baler was sold and replaced with a compactor unit which is used to process recyclables and serves as back up to the twenty year old solid waste compactor. We have experienced nearly 100% positive feedback from residents whom much prefer the ease of single sort in the home while allowing us to operate on several hundred thousand less tax payer dollars per year. Our cost to dispose of a ton of solid waste last year held steady at \$60 as did the cost to dispose of a ton of recyclables at \$0. We have experienced an 8% increase in our recycling rate since the switch to single sort helping us to hold costs down. For detailed information on what products can now be recycled through our single sort program rather than be landfilled please contact the Transfer Station @ 897-5552. As part of our ongoing effort to promote recycling we now only accept trash at the facility or at the curb if it is in a clear bag. Clear bags can be purchased at our local grocery, at the Transfer Station or at the Town Office. We now sell both 30 gallon and 15 gallon size bags.


The department last year through handling fees charged other communities using different aspects of our facility and the sale of marketable commodities generated nearly \$80,000 in revenue for the Town to apply against the tax commitment.

We held our annual Household Hazardous Waste collection day last year in June to take advantage of State grants funds that were available prior to June 30th. Unfortunately these funds will not be available in 2012 so we have moved our collection day back to the Fall where it historically has been held. September 15, 2012 is our tentative date. Information will be posted on our web site and numerous public locations as the collection day approaches.

We thank you for your continuing support and look forward to serving you in the coming year.



Annual Report of the Highway Department



To: The Citizens of Jay

Last year snowfall totaled 98" with February being the snowiest month producing 31 inches. The seasons total was added to later with a 13 inch event in April. Last winter was the first year that anyone can recall that our department did not plow and sand the school properties. Maintenance of our school buses was also shifted away from the public works garage. As you well know, our schools are now part of an RSU making three member towns responsible for sharing in the cost of operation. As a result one position in the department was not funded going forward setting current crew size at ten employees. That is three less than just a few years ago.

Equipment replacement for the year consisted of trading a 2000 Chevrolet pickup for a 2012 Ford F-250 pickup. This unit is used to plow town lots including fire stations, police dept., town office, library, etc and to fill in on regular plow routes when other units are disabled. Also a full size 2000 Volvo tandem axle plow truck was traded for a 2011 Ford F-550 complete with plow gear. This downsizing saved nearly \$90k in upfront costs and will prove to be cheaper to maintain and operate over the life of the unit. We are now left with four full size dump / plow trucks. Our ongoing Mutual Aid Agreements with neighboring towns help make this downsizing possible.

Construction projects last year included Alden Hill Rd and a large section of the Bean Road which were both rebuilt and left as gravel roads. As was the case last year with the Canton Mt Road the existing asphalt was removed, processed and used as a surface material. This is a continuation of the road committee's effort to reduce the mileage that needs to be cycled through the paving program. Roads or sections of roads that were paved last year include Macomber Hill Road, Lomie


Rivers Road, Barker Street, Ludden Drive, Chick a Dee Avenue, Spring Street, Forest Circle, Fuller Road and Mill View Road. Chip seals were applied to Farrington Road, Bar Bridge Drive, Belanger Road and Granite Heights. Also crack sealing was done on Davis Road. A projected 2012 paving program was posted on the town's web site last December.

Other projects of note completed in 2011 were a water line and spigot were installed at the entrance to the Jay Hill Cemetery for public use, several miles of ditch line were cleaned, storm drain manholes were vacuumed out and the exit at the town office was rebuilt. Permission was secured and trees removed from property at the intersection of Hyde Road and Franklin Street in an attempt to improve visibility. The selectmen have committed to MDOT that they will schedule a town meeting whenever required to request local match funds to be used in conjunction with MDOT funds to rebuild and realign the intersection involving East Jay Road, Hyde Road and Franklin Road. Hopefully next year we'll be able to report that project has been done making a dangerous situation safer for all.

Looking forward to this year, extensive sewer and water line replacements are scheduled in the Chisholm area to be followed by road reconstruction and paving on several streets. Also the route #4 project is slated to be completed this summer allowing us all to get back to our normal driving habits. Be aware that MDOT currently has the next phase of the Route #4 upgrade from Pineau Street to Riley Road funded and on schedule to start in 2013.

Annual Report of the Jay Planning Board

The Town of Jay Planning Board continues to hold meetings on the second Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Office. As always, the public is more than welcome to attend. There are currently two alternate positions available on the Board.

During 2011, the Board held 9 regular meetings and conducted several site review visits. The Board issued a Flood Hazard permit amendment to Jeffrey Boivin for a timber harvest off the Morse Hill Road and issued an amendment to the Shoreland Zoning permit of Central Maine Power for poles being placed as part of their Reliability Program. The Board also reviewed four subdivision amendments. These reviews involved meeting with applicants, notifying neighbors, conducting site review visits, as well as communicating with public utilities, surveyors, and site assessors. In the end, the Board worked with the applicants to resolve any issues that arose during the review process and ultimately approved each of the proposals. Subdivision Permits were issued to: Toby Kachnovich for amendment of the Bickford Development on the Bickford Road; Susan Weston and Stephen Haley for amendment of Weston's Granite Quarry Subdivision located off the Keep Road; Community Concepts for amendment of Country View Estates on Dale Lane; and Christopher Powers for amendment of the Melvin Subdivision located on the Franklin Road.

Several members of the Board also attended a multi-class Subdivision and Site Review Workshop sponsored by the Androscoggin Valley Council of Governments that was designed to give local planning boards more insight and understanding into the rules and regulations surrounding these topics.

The Planning Board worked diligently throughout the summer and fall on proposed amendments to the Subdivision Ordinance. The amendment, which will be voted on at the June 2012 Town Meeting, includes provisions to bring the current Ordinance into conformance with State guidelines; clarifies the definition of road frontage; reduces the filing fee for subdivision amendments; and changes the requirements for notifications to abutters.

In May, the Planning Board regretfully accepted the resignation of long time Board Member, Maynard Veinotte. Maynard has been a very dedicated member and we are truly grateful for all of the contributions that he made to the Board.

During 2011, the Comprehensive Plan Update Committee, which included several members of the Planning Board, completed their task of updating the Town's 1996 Comprehensive Plan. In June the Town approved the updated plan and in July the State Planning Office found the Plan to be "complete" and "consistent" with the Maine Growth Management Act. The time and effort of all members of the Committee was greatly appreciated. In the upcoming year the Town will be considering and implementing many of the recommendations of the Plan.

Effective December 1, 2010, the State adopted the Maine Uniform Building and Energy Code (MUBEC). The Town of Jay will be required to begin enforcement of the Code beginning July 1, 2012. Information on the MUBEC can be found at: www.maine.gov/dps/bbcs. Residents will be voting on an Administrative Ordinance relating to the MUBEC at the June 2012 Town Meeting. The outcome of that vote will determine how the Town administers the new code. If you are planning to do any type of construction or alterations after July 1st, please contact the Town Office prior to beginning your project to find out what the requirements are.

During the year, the Town Office receives many calls from citizens, builders, developers and the like, questioning what, if any, regulations the Town may have on various projects. The answers to many of these questions can be found on the Town of Jay's website at www.jay-maine.org under the heading Departments then Code Enforcement. Town of Jay Ordinances are also available on line under the heading Town Office then Ordinances.

To the Citizens of Jay,


Another year and another 135,000,000 gallons of wastewater thru the sewer mains, pumping stations and treatment facilities of your Sewer Department.

The past year has been quite productive. In addition to the day to day operation of the facilities, the ME DOT Route 4 / Main Street project occupied much of our time. At the end of the construction season, 99% of the underground infrastructure for the Sewer Department was in place. Most of the work that remains is to raise the manhole structures to the finished grade elevation for the final course of pavement. Although there may have been (and will continue to be) miscellaneous "issues" with the projects implementation, the sewer infrastructure portion of the project has gone reasonably well. The Contractor, Pratt and Son's, has done a good job for the community and has been very good to work with when unforeseen issues arise that require cooperation of the entities involved with the project.

Over the next year we plan to replace the 1997 utility body 1 ton truck with a newer model. Also, we plan to replace the 1989 2,000 gallon tank truck with a larger 6,000-8,000 gallon tanker. Currently, we are looking into the possibility of purchasing the 2002 tractor trailer truck from the Recycling Facility when it is replaced and buying or building a trailer tanker to tow behind the truck. This would allow redundancy for the Recycling Facility should their trailer truck be out of service and also be a cost effective way for the Sewer Department to replace the smaller 2,000 gallon tanker with a 6,000-8,000 gallon unit.

In the Spring/Summer of 2012 we plan to replace the water, sewer and drain infrastructure (as needed) beneath Free, Riverview and Lavoie Streets then reconstruct and repave the streets.

The Jay Fire Department has had a very busy year by responding to 197 emergency calls for service. The fire department also went through a restructuring of its command staff last year and it has worked very well. The command staff now has fewer officers. It is made up of a Public Safety Director, Assistant Chief, Captain and three Lieutenants.

We traded in our aging 1989 Tanker truck and a 1988 Engine. Both were very outdated and didn't meet the standards of today. We purchased a new Tanker truck and used the old Tanker and Engine as a trade in. The new Tanker is also a pumper which the old unit was not. We should not have to replace another truck for some years to come.

We also requested the Maine Bureau of Labor Standards to do a voluntary courtesy inspection of both station one and station two to help bring the department into compliance. The department worked very hard this past year and will be awarded the SHAPE award from the Maine Bureau of Labor Standards. This is a great achievement for the fire department and means that your fire department has attained the highest level of recognition for safety, training and policy compliance. This award has never been awarded to the Jay Fire Department before.

A new roof had to be placed on station two as the old one was leaking and the roof was very worn. The station is now in good condition and should not need any further major repairs.




Our membership has grown a lot this past year, which is great news. We now have over 40 members. This is within the range that we should have to man the fire stations in an efficient manner.



This has been a very expensive year for the society. Due to the very wet low lawn at the front of the homestead, we installed a beautiful brick walkway between the homestead and the archive building. Also, we had a small porch built at the side door of the homestead where there is the original 1820s stone well. The well has a new cover with an interior plexiglass cover for display of the interior stone work. The huge project with which we're faced now is dealing with the wet basement in the homestead. So far, we have had drainage installed all around the floor edges and a sump pump installed to take care of water. However, the beams and sub-floor under the house are so deteriorated that they have to be replaced. This very expensive project will have to be done as soon as possible.



The Jay-Niles Memorial Library Board of Trustees and staff would like to thank the town of Jay and our wonderful patrons for another exceptional year!

For the fiscal year 2010/2011, a total of 16,264 visits were made to the library. Total internet time logged was 1,962.45 hours with a total of 2,633 people using our computers or our wireless on their laptops.

Our summer reading programs were very well attended once again this year. The Children's Summer Reading Program was titled: "Catch a Good Book". Eighty-two young people signed up with 68% reader participation. Our Tween/Teen Summer Reading Program was "Camp Out at Jay-Niles Memorial Library This Summer" and had a camping theme which included a sleepover at the library!!! We had 21 young people sign up for the program with 50% turning in time read for a total of 1,561 hours. Participation in activities was 75%.

Our Reading Lady and Children's Librarian, Priscilla Pineau continues to make visits to the Jay-Elementary School on Thursdays and Fridays during the school year. During the 2010/2011 school year, Mrs. Pineau presented 1,762 books over 31 weeks to an average of 239 students weekly from 17 classrooms for a total of 152 hours and 5 minutes of classroom presentation time from September 16, 2010-June 9, 2011. Mrs. Pineau introduced new books and curriculum related books in the Jay-Niles collection.

We had another terrific year running our Book and Film Discussion Group for adults. We averaged about 10 books and their adaptations this last year. Total attendance for the book/film group was 131 people.


The Preschool Story and Craft-time and the Lap-sit programs continue to be popular. We had a total of 423 attendees over two ten-week sessions during the Autumn of 2010 and Winter/Spring 2011.





At June 30, 2011, the Town had \$5.76 million in bonds outstanding versus \$5.66 million last year.

The Town has steadily maintained a sufficient undesignated fund balance to sustain government operations for a period of approximately two months, while also maintaining significant reserve accounts for future capital and program needs.



Dear Jay residents and friends,

These days I'm as frustrated as anyone with the partisan gridlock in Washington. Even the most routine congressional functions, such as passing budgets, are caught up in irresponsible political games. One way to stop this is a bill I am pushing that would make sure members of Congress wouldn't get paid if they fail to pass budget and appropriation bills on time. It is time for Congress to get serious and show some common sense.

Yet, despite congressional dysfunction, I'm pleased to report progress on a number of initiatives important to Maine. Last year, Congress passed the Small Business Jobs Act, which included my amendment to ensure Maine small business lending agencies qualified for funding under the bill. As a result, Maine received \$13.2 million last September to support small business development. Since a requirement of the funding was to match every federal dollar with 10 additional dollars, that one investment is expected to spur \$132 million in small business lending in our state.

My work in support of our nation's veterans continues to be very important to me. Last October, the House passed a measure I authored to ensure that severely disabled and elderly veterans are able to get the care they need at Maine's state veterans' homes. I'm pleased that it passed unanimously in the House, and I'm hopeful the Senate acts on it soon.

We still have much work to do to create jobs and grow our national and state economies. Last year, I visited many Maine manufacturers and received a tremendous amount of valuable feedback. After these visits, and having heard back from over 85 Maine companies that filled out an online survey I created, it was made clear to me that legislative action is needed at the federal level to do more to boost our manufacturers and the positive impact they have on our economy.

My highest priority has always been ensuring that Mainers receive timely and quality constituent services. 
